

ARTICULATED CREDIT

What is articulated credit?

Articulated Credit is a college credit waiver granted through an agreement between the Career Tech Center and specific colleges/universities. Students receive college credit based on classes completed and skills learned; credit generally does not transfer between colleges and universities.

(Not all colleges/universities grant credit for every CTC program.)

What are the advantages?

- Gives students a head start in college
- Decreases the cost of college
- Provides opportunities for advanced study
- Provides direction for education
- Reinforces information and promotes further education

How do students apply?

Each college or university has a different process. Make an appointment with Mrs. Pulsipher to be sure you don't miss a step. Most college or universities offering credit require at least:

- Finish the entire program with a B (3.00) or better
- Complete all skills and assignments related to college class skills requirements
- Apply to the college
- Fill out the correct forms with Mrs. Pulsipher within two years of high school graduation (1 year for Ferris State University).
- Send a final transcript from your high school
- Sign up for and complete college classes at that college
- Meet with your college advisor after your first semester in college to finalize credits

Note:

- Articulated credit is NOT automatic. Students must complete the entire process.
- Colleges/Universities have the right to accept or reject credit.
- Articulated credit does not always transfer between institutions because it is not graded on a college transcript.
- Career Tech Center grades are reported on a student's regular high school transcripts.
